American Literature Before the 20th Century

Course aims and objectives:

By taking this course, students are supposed to acquire the basic knowledge on American literary modernism, the representative works of the period and cultural and historical context from the beginning of the 20th century to the Movement for Gender Equality of the sixties. This course represents the connection between the American Literature before the 20th Century and American Literature after the 1970s courses.

Learning outcomes:

After completing this module / course successfully, the students will be able:

- to make the critical reflection of the fundamental features of the American literature of the first half of the 20th century,
- to recognize the representative works of the period, to make comparisons among them and to contextualize them,
- to make successful comparisons between the representative works of the period and the works of the previous literary period of American literature.
- to perform textual analysis and contextualization of the representative poetic, prose and dramatic texts of the period,
- to successfully perform textual analysis and contextualization of the similar examples in Modern American literature,
- to make the synthesis of several works successfully, placing them in wider social and critical contexts.

Teaching and learning methods:

Lectures, practical classes, papers and presentations.

Course description: Introduction to the theory of modernism in poetry, prose and drama; historical background, interpretation of the representative works of the American South, the features of modern culture; the 1930s and the Second World War as a great milestone, postwar literature; insight into the literature of the American black people; Feminism and American literature.
