Course aims and objectives: This course conceptually represents the continuation of the English Grammar 1 course, with the consequent expansion of the subject matter, in order to present the foundations of grammar of the English language comprehensively to the students. The emphasis is placed on both the acquisition of theoretical knowledge and practical training of students for further analyses and the use of grammatical constructions encompassed by the subject matter.

Course description: This course represents the continuation of the systematic overview of the form and structure of grammar in contemporary English language and is based on the English Grammar 1 course. The course is devoted to the study of phenomenology regarding the description and the use of grammatical categories of English language.
