Course objectives

The aim of the course is to introduce students to the most important aspects of literary theory and methodology of the study of literature today. In Contemporary Literary Theories students learn about a wide and diverse range of approaches to literary works, with the aim of gaining a good insight into modern theoretical and critical thought, and of acquiring quality knowledge, meant to help young philologists in academic research and writing their first papers on topics related to the study of literature.

Learning outcomes

On completing the Contemporary Literary Theories course, students will have acquired a thorough knowledge of literary theory and the ability to apply it in interpreting literary texts. They will also have developed the ability to study literary texts in a quality and comprehensive manner, by selecting for their research papers among the most up-to-date theoretical and methodological approaches to the study of literary works. In that way, the knowledge acquired in this course will help young literary scholars to join and be ready to actively participate in the work of their academic community, write and publish research papers, take part in conferences, etc.

Course topics

An overview of poetic thought from Plato and Aristotle to positivism. Theory and poetics. The anti-positivist turn. *Literary theory* and *literary theories* in the 20th century. Psychoanalytic, archetypal and myth criticism. Stylistics as literary criticism. Russian formalism. Bakhtin. New Criticism. Phenomenology. Hermeneutics. Semiotics. Structuralism. Poststructuralism. Reception theory. Deconstruction. Marxist and neo-Marxist literary criticism. Pragmatism. Postcolonial theory and criticism. Feminist theory and criticism. Gender and queer studies. Comparative literary studies. Imagology and collective mentality studies. Intertextuality. Intermediality. Narratology. Cultural studies. New historicism and cultural materialism. Postmodern literary theory. Post-theory.

Teaching methods and strategies

Lectures, seminars, discussion sessions.
